Examination success

We also had great success in the January AS examinations with all students getting As and Bs in Spanish and in Mathematics there were 3Bs and an E. Some of these stu-

dents will resit the papers to endeavour to increase their mark even more but we should congratulate them for this great performance.

COVID-19

As will know, despite our very best efforts we have had to close the early Years and Lower primary as a precautionary measure. We have a number of staff off sick and are unable to maintain the safety of the children in school. COVID-19 has finally caught up with us I am sad to say. Please can i politely remind you that children in quarantine must remain in quarantine. We know that some of the year 4s were out playing over half term while they should have been at home. It is unfortunate to have to ask but these are the situations which cause these outbreaks. I have reminded staff once again to ensure they (we) all follow the very strictest of protocols until the situation significantly improves.

We have had about eight staff members off this week and those remaining in school have been incredible - they have

taught their own lessons and covered those for colleagues so that all classes could run as normal. Remembering that they are also marking assessments, writing reports and preparing for two imminent inspections, I mention it here as a way of publicly acknowledging my appreciation. I am pleased to say that all of our support staff, kitchen staff, teachers etc have been contacted and are currently in the process of making appointments to receive their vaccinations, which is of course, great news for the continued safety of our school community.

Students looking after each other

We have been talking to the Year 7s this week about helping each other and we have decided to set up a small student group to help stop some low level bullying amongst the students. As you know, bullying happens in every school and it happens as some young people try to navigate relationships and their place amongst peer groups. I explained to the students that often, students who bully others either verbally or physically, do so as a way of crying out for help. The student group will encourage students to help each other before such disagreements get out of hand. We are very excited by this initiative and am sure it will be an excellent opportunity for our younger students to learn how to help and support each other.

Inspections

On Tuesday we have two inspectors from NABSS in school to inspect our 6th form. This is an important process in the school's short history and we have worked hard to be ready for it. The following week we have the long awaited IB Verification Visit, again we believe we are more than ready and are feeling confident for both.

EYFS & LOWER PRIMARY

What a fantastic first days of the week of the new half term we have had. To let you in on a secret, one of my favourite parts of being in the school is seeing the EYFS children rush into the classroom or onto the patio in the morning to greet their friends and see their teachers. It was truly delightful to see this on Monday morning after being away from school for a week. The children have settled back into the routine brilliantly and have been focusing on developing their story telling skills as we worked towards yesterday's 'World Book Day' celebrations. Well done to everybody for their hard work this week and we look forward to seeing even more as the half term continues !

In Nursery we were working with numbers up to 5 and exploring the different ways to make 5. We have been practicing writing , verbally counting and identifying different numbers throughout the week. Our story telling theme has led up to the Jack and the Beanstalk story . The children have loved learning the different parts of the story and were very brave when we met the scary Giant! Yesterday, we planted some beans to learn what the plants need to grow. We look forward to seeing how they grow over time as we care for them!

In Reception, we have been looking at numbers up to the number 7 and exploring different single digit numbers. We have had a wonderful time in the forest and have really enjoyed developing our storytelling skills with our book 'That ´s why we don ´t eat animals ´ . The children have been drawing and writing about sections of the book and have loved every second of it !

Year One have had a great first few days back this week! In our Maths lessons, we have been exploring counting in 2s and 5s and making different resources to help us remember this!

In English we have been reading and performing the Enormous Turnip and reading different versions of the story to explore how stories can be retold differently. On Wednesday we went to Forest School and created a self portrait using natural objects (and of course drank tasty hot chocolate!) What a great first week back for Year One!





Year Two have been busy exploring shape this week. The children have loved playing with the 2D and 3D shapes within the school. The children have been focusing on 2D shapes this week and learning all the appropriate vocabulary. The children have loved all the different shape names and found some of them very funny indeed! Octagon, quadrilateral and rhombus are among their favourites! Over the week the children have made 2D shapes using things found in Forest School, they have traced 3D faces to show 2D shapes, they have played online shape games and they have used rulers to draw their very own 2D shapes! We even went on a hunt for 2D shapes around the school! The children have been loving this topic and are excited to continue this learning (virtually) next week when we look at lines of symmetry and 3D shapes.

In our English lessons, we have been immersing ourselves into the story of Little Charlie as we develop our skills as storytellers. We have verbally retold the story using actions to help us remember key grammar points, repetitive story sections and key parts of the story... watch this space for more amazing work as we grow as storytellers and writers !

I must also say a huge congratulations to the Blue team who have won this week's EYFS House point award. Remember to keep working hard to gain house points for your teams !

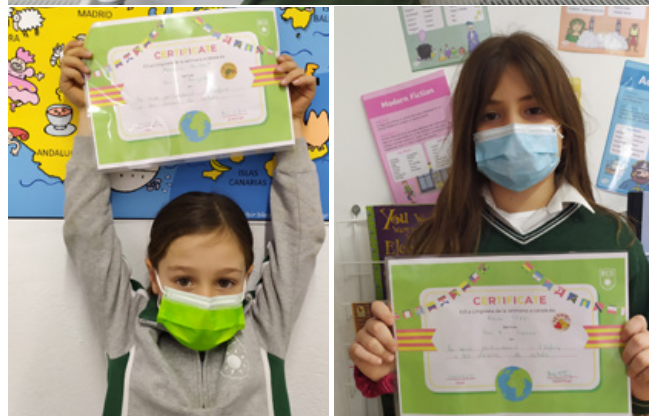
International Women's day

All worked very hard revising Pure Maths over Christmas, and were rewarded with good passing grades.



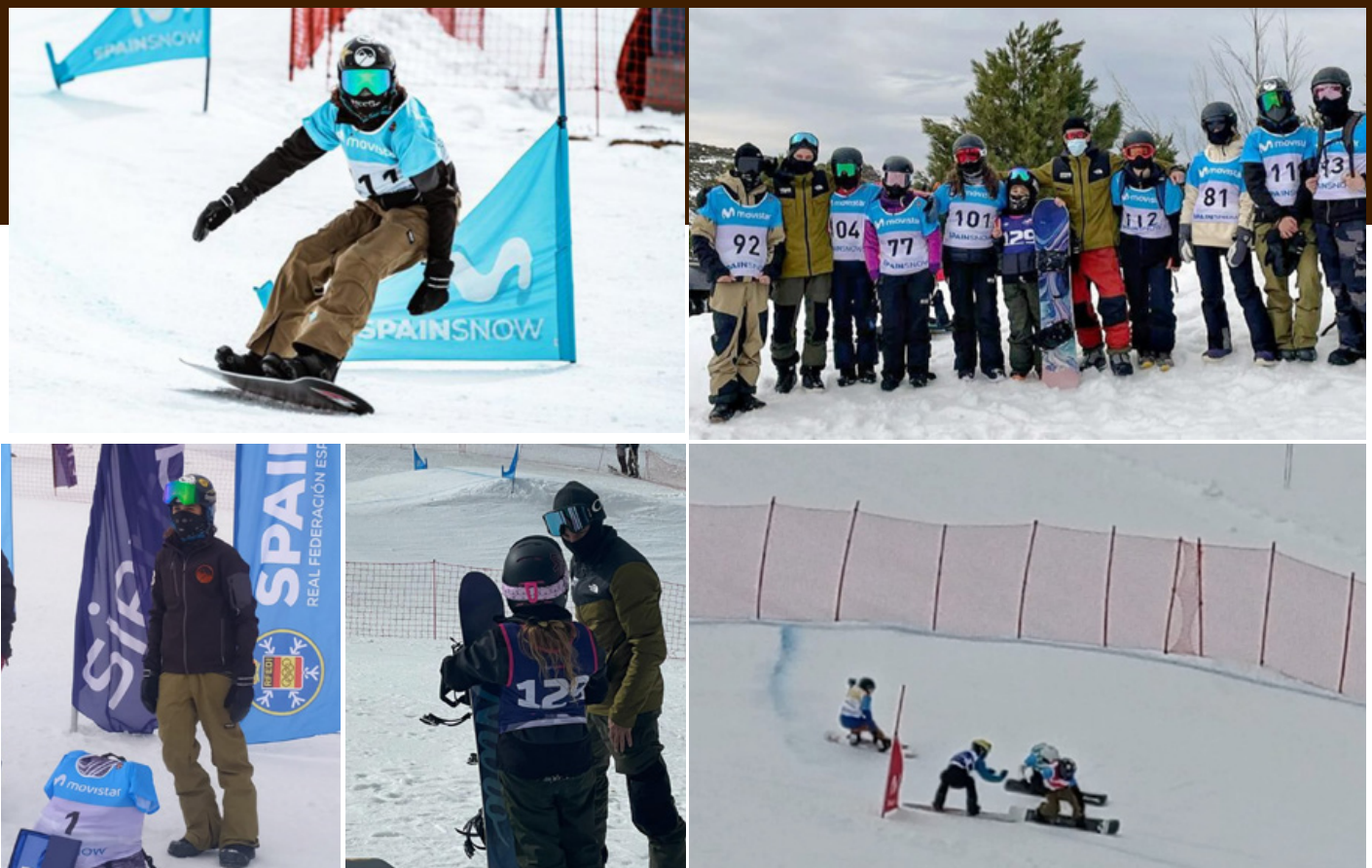
