In addition, the students have been able to make the most of their free time by playing traditional games and exploring in the stunning natural environment and the facilities that were offered to us.

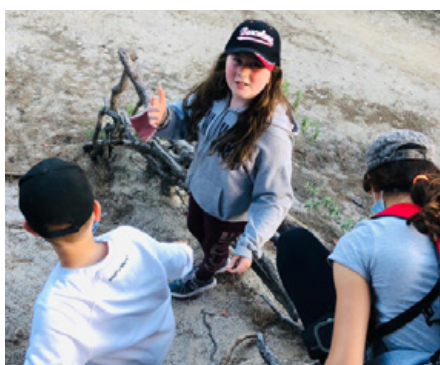
who have never ever spent a night away from home, demonstrating resilience and just how much they are growing up. These elements of the trip have been magical for me personally.

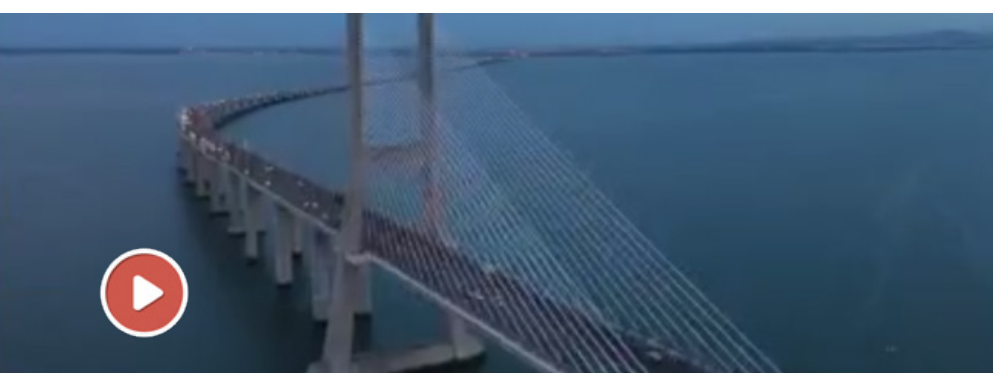


# Language of the month

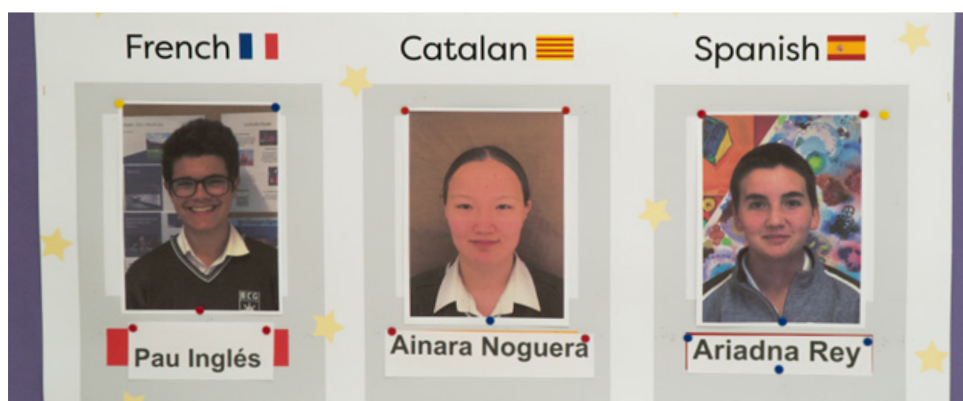
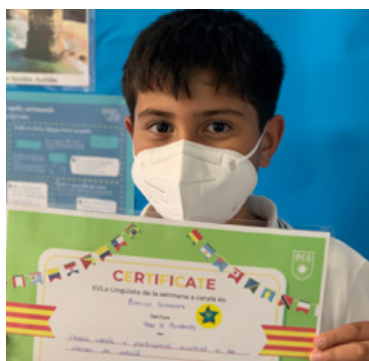
